Staff Aid Firemen at Night Blaze

Brewery employees who were at their homes and elsewhere in the vicinity of the brewery were early on the scene, and rendered invaluable help to the "army" of firemen who were mobilised to fight a threatening blaze at Staines Brewery on the night of January 11.

By their "local" knowledge of the premises they were able to provide vital information promptly to the Fire Service officers directing operations, and a senior fire brigade officer said afterwards: "Such timely nelp materially assisted us in rescripting the extent of the outbreak".

Our staff also actively assisted in both the fire-fighting and the salvage work, preventing additional damage from the effects of smoke, heat and water.

Charge-hand Checker W. Benham was in a nearby hotel when a woman came in and called out, "The brewery's on fire".

Racing back to the brewery, Mr. Benham tried to check the flames with an extinguisher, and then called the fire brigade and the police by telephone.

Amongst those who were quickly on the scene were Herbert Dexter, carpenter, and one-time fireman in the Staines fire brigade; Mr. H. L. Aust, Resident Head Bottler, from his cottage at the brewery; Mr. E. Gosney, Branch Manager, called

Life's Like This

Only two days before the big fire at Staines Brewery on January 11, one of the three bottling units, No. 2, was taken out of service for an overhaul and the work was commenced.

In the fire involving the Bottling Store, No. 3 bottling unit was damaged and put out of action.

Only the No. 1 unit was left in service, but supplies were adequately maintained with assistance from Reading.

by telephone from his home at Farnborough; and Mr. G. Dyer, Area Surveyor, summoned likewise from Sunningdale.

Later came Mr. E. D. Simonds, Mr. W. J. Watkins, Chief Engineer, Mr. E. J. Hollebone, Mr. W. Heley and Mr. A. E. Wake from Reading, who had been promptly notified at their homes of the incident.

Damage included a large area of roof of the Bottling Store, one of the bottling units, the painters' workshop, where paint and tools were destroyed, the plumbers' workshop, and spread to a staff cloakroom.

The fire was threatening the Guinness stock room where thousands of dozens of Guinness were conditioning, when it was checked.

A much appreciated gesture was made by Mr. John Chadwick, our Manager at the "Pack Horse" Hotel in Staines, who offered his personal help and accommodation at the hotel if it were needed.

Despite the damage, supplies from the Staines Branch, which covers South-West Middlesex and a large area of Hampshire and Surrey, were not affected due to assistance provided from Reading.

The boys, who had a most enjoyable treat, have asked me to personally convey to you and your Committee their most grateful thanks for a wonderful day.





efforts to please somebody—if anybody at all.




Two former members of the Wheelwrights Department now on National Service are together again in Germany serving in the 1st Battalion Royal Berkshire Regiment at Goslar.
