# Staines Head Bottler Retires

PRESENTATION TO MR. AUST

After more than 49 years' service in our employ, Mr. H. L. Aust, Head Bottler at Staines Branch, retired on March 31.

Before his departure, Mr. Aust received a presentation at an informal ceremony at the Staines Brewery of a china cabinet and a barometer from his colleagues at Reading and Staines.

Mr. E. Gosney presented the gifts to Mr. Aust, and wished him a long and happy retirement.

A further presentation to Mr. Aust was made by General Dempsey at a meeting of the Board of Directors on April 25 of a silver rose bowl suitably inscribed in recognition of his long and loyal service.

Mr. Aust, in reply to the congratulations of General Dempsey, recalled his years of happy service with the Company and, in thanking the Directors for their presentation, stated that it would be a gift he would treasure for the remainder of his days.

#### "Leaden Shots and Hot Liquor"


Mr. Aust commenced his service with the Company in June, 1906, as a label boy in the Wine and Spirit Department, subsequently being moved to the Bottle-Washing Department. In those days a vastly different system was used for the

cleansing of bottles and jars, compared with the up-to-date methods of today. Mr. Aust must be one of the few left who used the method of leaden shots and hot liquor for cleaning wine and spirit bottles.

#### The Company Sergeant-Major

During World War I, Mr. Aust served in the Royal Berkshire Regiment, and rose to the rank of Company Sergeant-Major. On demobilisation he returned to the Wine and Spirit Department as Foreman of the Washing Department, and later took charge of the Beer Bottling Department, and subsequently was in charge of the Bottled Beer Loading Stage.

In April, 1946, he was transferred to Staines as Head Bottler, and held that position until his retirement.

Nearly 3,800 miles were travelled during the 1954-55 soccer season by the Brewery's three football referees, Alan Hitchman (Delivery Office), Eric Scott (Wine Stores) and Richard Sawdon-Smith (Accounts) during their journeys to officiate at 138 matches.

Alan Hitchman's 51 matches took him to Henley on twelve occasions, and to Oxford, Didcot, Hounslow, Motspur Park, Chesham, Uxbridge, Edgware and Chesham amongst other places. He refereed two Semi-Finals and the Final of the Henley Charity Cup. For all this he travelled 1,456 miles.

To only three less matches, 48, went Eric Scott travelling 1,420 miles, to Oxford, Abingdon, Horsham, Weybridge, Uxbridge, Edgware, Yiewsley, Guildford and Chesham.

Eric was requested to referee the Inter-League match between the Reading and District League and the Reading and District Institute League, but had to decline owing to another appointment. He lined at Elm Park for Reading's floodlit friendly match against St. Mirren, thus making up for the match he missed against Partick Thistle which was cancelled owing to the weather.

T.A. training at the beginning of the season, when there are usually a lot of mid-week matches meant a reduction in mileage, compared with his colleagues, for Richard Sawdon-Smith, who travelled 916 miles to officiate at 39 matches at Oxford, Woking, Wallingford, Motspur Park, Didcot and Abingdon.
