A COMPANY DIES

It is a sad day when a loved one, or a dear friend, "passes on," so perhaps you can understand our feelings at the passing of the Octagon Brewery.

Twenty-seven years ago, in February, 1928, I came to the Octagon as a raw youth, selected by the late Mr. J. B. Ferry, then Secretary and Managing Director of the Company, to fulfil the onerous (?) duties of Office Junior. Those twenty-seven years have been rich in experience, of successes won and difficulties overcome, of the helping hand of my seniors guiding me over the stormy passages of business life. I have seen many changes, and particularly since the end of the last war. Sadly but surely, as the economic signposts point, the smaller family business must give way to the larger unit in the interests of efficiency. But one factor is unchanged—we still work as a team, for the common good of all concerned.

Memory flits back over the years as I think and remember all my old colleagues and fellow employees: of Arthur Howard, who helped me a lot in my studies as an aspiring accountant; the late F. J. Pearse, our old Accountant, Ben Rousseau, Bill Winter, and Les (Ginger) Weaver, now mine host at the Trelawny Hotel, St. Budeaux. In the Brewery there were Sid Worth, Bill Long, George and Charlie Cox, Bill Shapter and others. I recall how my vocal efforts used to amuse the old Bottling Staff, and have given George Rawles and Charlie Scott many a good laugh. Then

there was Harold Little, our engineer, now retired, notable for his pungent comments on life, and various members of the staff in particular—a very good scout all the same.

The war years. Victor Vicary being snatched away from a cricket match in 1939 to put on a uniform he did not take off until 1946. Of Cyril Robertson and myself presenting ourselves at Lambhay Hill Drillhall on September 1st, 1939, at five a.m., for medical inspection on mobilisation; poor Cyril perished on an enemy transport whilst being taken to Japan as a P.O.W. So the picture unfolds—bringing back memories of service with 43rd Wessex RASC (T.A.) at Gillingham in Dorset... departure for overseas... service in Egypt, the Western Desert, Tripoli... the turn of the tide... Italy, with sunny Naples, Salerno with its grim memories, and Ancona. Invalided home due to a breakdown... recovery, and return to duty.

These and other things I remember: the kindness shown, the understanding in those early post-war years, when the effects of service were felt... Differences of opinion—well, we have all of us had these; it is healthy to be so... Recriminations and bitterness—NO!

The King is dead! Long live the King!

So we salute our new employers, and assure them that we will give of our best, and endeavour to uphold the worthy traditions of the larger Simonds family.

A BACKROOM BOY OF SPORT

The following article about Mr. F. J. Chandler, our S. Oxfordshire Sales Representative, appeared recently in the *Oxford Sports Mail*.

When he was voted to the council in 1950, Mr. Frederick John Chandler became the youngest member of the Oxfordshire Football Association's officers, and it was particularly fitting that he should be appointed county youth secretary and secretary of the Oxfordshire Minor (now Youth) League.

At 38, Mr. Chandler is still young enough to enjoy the company of, and to work for, the younger generation and he has thrown himself wholeheartedly into the responsibilities given him by the O.F.A., which has also entrusted him with the secretaryship of the Northern Section of the Oxfordshire Intermediate League.

He is Oxford bred and born—"and proud of it, too"—and since he was born at The Rose and Crown, George Street, Summertown, the site of which is now occupied by Messrs. Oliver and Gurden's bakery, it is not perhaps surprising that he is now a travelling representative of a well-known firm of brewers.

Mr. Chandler has had a fairly long experience of sport, both as an active participant and as an official.

While at South Oxford School, which he attended before going on to the now defunct Bedford House School, he did a good deal of cross-country running and played soccer for the 1st Oxford Company Boys'

Brigade, an organisation for which he still holds the greatest admiration.

Before the war he was a keen table tennis player, played for Osberton Radiators, and at one time was general secretary of the Oxfordshire Table Tennis Association.

For several years he was also general secretary of the Osberton Radiators Welfare and Sports Club, which, with its 16 sections, meant that he was a very busy man.

He was particularly interested in the football section and organised the club's sports and gala day, which is not now held.

When Mr. Chandler gave up playing football he became a referee and reached Class I. Because of his many other duties he has had to hang up his boots and whistle, but while serving with the Royal Air Force during the war he refereed many first-class matches.

As county youth secretary, it is his job to organise trial matches, to select teams for the F.A. County Youth Challenge Cup competition, and he still yearns for the time when all club secretaries will make a 100 per cent effort to help him in his job by recommending players when invited to do so.

Fred Chandler has thrown all his energy and experience into the organisation of youth football in Oxfordshire, and his modesty and friendliness has deservedly won for him the admiration and respect of many hundreds of footballers and officials in the county.

1815 TIPS ON BEER

Some drastic methods of improving beer are included in an old book printed in 1815, and entitled "The Innkeeper's and Publican's Sure Guide," which recently came into the possession of Mr. John C. Hastings, Assistant Manager of the Hotels and Catering Department.

Here are some of them:

How to fine ale, or any other malt liquor, after thunder, or any cause that makes it thick or cloudy

Take about a gallon of beer that is thick, or cloudy, put it into a saucepan, add about one ounce of new hops, and a handful of salt, boil it over a fire for half an hour, return it into the barrel, and stir it well for about ten minutes, and in twelve hours the beer will be as fine as rock water.

N.B. The above is a sufficient quantity for a barrel, or thirty-six gallons, and so in proportion for larger or smaller casks.

How to cure ropery beer or ale

Take a small handful of hissop, tie it in a bundle, put it into the cask or barrel, stir it well with a stick for a quarter of an hour and

bung down, and the beer will be perfectly cured in a week at most.

How to restore stale or hard beer or ale

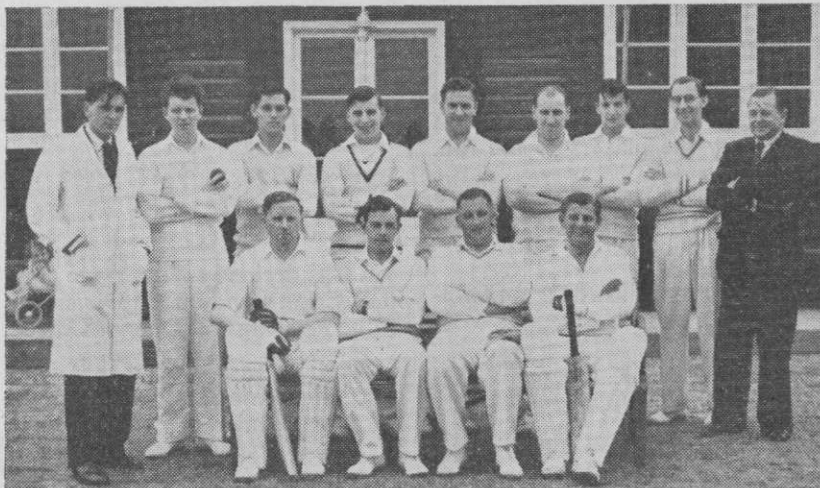
Take the upper crust of a six-penny loaf and toast it very hard. Cover it well with mustard (made with simple water), cut it into square pieces, put it into the cask and in a fortnight it will be as mild as when brewed only a month or two.

To bottle ale

When you intend to bottle your ale, leave the bung out for a few days as with porter and the same care is to be observed as to the bottles and corks. Take a teaspoonful of brown sugar or raisin and put it into each bottle and your ale will be fit for use in a very short time. You must be careful not to place your bottles too near each other in case any should burst, which will sometimes happen and one bottle may break several.

We need hardly say that these methods would earn the severe disapproval of our Head Brewer if they were tried today!

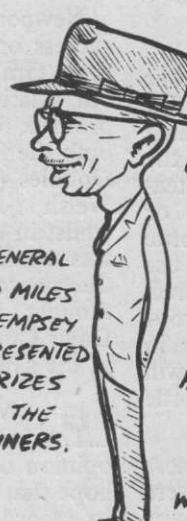
