NEW SOCIAL CLUB OPENED

Despite the usual downpour of rain outside, there was a capacity crowd drawn from all Departments of the Brewery to witness the opening of the new Social Club in Castle Street by the Chairman, General Sir Miles Dempsey, at 6.30 p.m. on Friday November 25th. Among those present were Mr. R. B. St. J. Quarry, Mr. E. D. Simonds, Mr. R. E. Southall, whose department has been reconcile for the conhas been responsible for the conversion of the premises, and Mr. R. Howie who was responsible for the furnishings.

In a short speech General Demp-sey recalled that the old Club had been opened on November 11th, 1921 by Mr. F. A. Simonds, who became its first President, and that the original Chairman, Mr. F. C. Hawkes and Secretary Mr. W. Bradford had served the Club for 34 years without a break. Although the old Club had included a billiard room and a darts room when it was first established, as the firm expanded, the Canteen, which was housed in the same building, gradually enroached upon the Club until it was left with little but a bar. It was for this reason that the Board decided last year to set aside enough money to provide a com-pletely new Club, in premises of its own, which would offer greatly improved facilities.

After drawing the first pint and drinking to the success of the new Club, General Dempsey was asked by the Secretary Mr. A. S. Davey to sign the Visitors Book and was followed by Mr. Quarry and Mr. Duncan Simonds. The celebration was rounded off with a successful dance for which the Astorians dance for which the Astorians provided the music.

provided the music. The Club, which is most attractively decorated and furnished, provides a spacious bar containing two dart boards and a bar billiards table. Next to the bar, is the billiard room, which con-tains a full size table. Some stairs lead up from it to the television room, which is carpeted and comfortably furnished with easy chairs. At the far end of the Club is the Functions Room where table tennis matches can be played or dances held. There is a Juke Box here for the young and below is a small but well fitted kitchen where snacks can be prepared. The kitchen contains a refrigerator, electric stove, bulk water heater, food store, ample cupboards and shelving and a lift so that food can be transferred easily to the Functions Room above. There is excellent accom-modation for the Club Steward in a flat above the bar and the premises also provide a bicycle store, cellar and the usual cloakrooms.

Altogether the new premises have created a most favourable impression on all those who have used them and the general reaction may perhaps be summed up in the remark made by many, "Far more attractive than I ever expected".

The bar in the old Club is now being converted into a much needed Recep-tion Centre for visitors to the Brewery and the old Committee rooms upstairs in the Canteen are being knocked together to provide a larger Staff Dining Room.

LONG SERVICE AWARDS

Since our last issue three members of the staff have received Gold Watches to mark their long service with the firm.

The first of these was Mr. A. T. Walsh of the Accounts Department walsh of the Accounts Department at Reading, who received his watch from General Sir Miles Dempsey at a Board Meeting on October 10th. Mr. Walsh joined our firm in October 1913, starting in the Cask

Office before moving on to the Branch Office some six months later.

In September, 1914 Mr. Walsh joined the Berks Yeomanry, but was trans-ferred to the 2nd Battalion Royal Berks in 1916 with whom he served in France. in 1916 with whom he served in France. During the fighting on the Somme he was gassed, which led to six months convalescence in England. As soon as he was fit again Mr. Walsh found him-self back in France, first with the 6th and then the 8th Battalion R. Berks. He finally transferred to the Machine Gun Corps with whom he finished the war as part of the Army of Occupation in Germany. in Germany.

After demobilisation in 1919 Mr. Walsh rejoined the Branch Office where his work was largely connected with the firm's Branches in Cairo, Dublin, Gib-raltar, Malta and Brussels. Later, until 1944 he was in the Shipping Section, when he moved to the Accounts Depart-ment where he has remained until the present time. present time.

Mr. Walsh carried out relief work from time to time at Brighton, Woking and Oxford and also had charge of the Aldershot Tattoo on the first occasion that the firm obtained the contract, which led to the award of a five year contract for the ensuing years contract for the ensuing years.

In his younger days Mr. Walsh played a good deal of tennis and was also interested in rowing and swimming. Nowadays he has settled for gardening as his major hobby.

Mr. G. H. Smith was presented with a gold watch by General Sir Miles Dempsey on November 7th; he joined Mackeson's Brewery, Hythe, in November 1911 and worked there under the foreman in the yard until the outbreak of war in 1914.

In the first instance he joined the Cyclist Corps, but when this was dis-banded shortly afterwards, he trans-ferred to the Royal West Kent Regi-ment with whom he was sent to India in 1915. The next four years were spent with his regiment which was sent to that notorious trouble spot the N.W. Frontier in order to try and keep the peace among the frontier tribes. Mr. Smith returned to Hythe after

peace among the frontier tribes. Mr. Smith returned to Hythe after the war and became a transport driver on a chain drive lorry. He remained there until the Brewery was taken over by our firm, when he moved to Reading for a short time before being sent as a driver to our Farnborough Branch. When this closed in 1929, Mr. Smith found himself back in Reading again where he has remained ever since, latterly as a checker on the Bottled Beer Loading Stage. Mr. W. J. Painter was given his

Mr. W. J. Painter was given his presentation gold watch by General Sir Miles Dempsey on November 9th. He joined our firm in October 1910 and worked under Mr. Ford in the Bottling Stores beneath the old offices until 1915, when he joined the R.A.S.C. as a horse transport driver.

After a short time at Aldershot and Woolwich Mr. Painter found himself on the way to Egypt with his unit in early 1916. They were soon transferred to 13th Division in Mesopotamia where Mr. Painter took part in one of the toughest campaigns of the war, before going down with Enteric Fever. This led to a long convalescence in India until he was fit enough to rejoin his unit in Mesopotamia once more. The end of the war saw him returned to India, whence he was sent to England for demobilisation late in 1920. He rejoined the firm and was em-

He rejoined the firm and was em-ployed in the Bottling Stores again before moving on to the Malt Stores in 1928 where he remained for eight months. Finally he was transferred to the Conditioning Room and Beer Cellars under Mr. Hasler, where he has remained until the present time.

FOOTBALL

The football teams are now well into their season. The first team into their season. The first team competing in the Premier Division of the Reading and District League has so far won just over half its league matches. Of the remaining four games, two have been drawn two lost. Some excellent and victories have been scored.


After a disappointing one all draw against Reading Exiles, a clear 3-0 win was gained against Albion Athletic, then came a 4-1 defeat by West Reading. This was followed by three consecutive league victories, against Wycombe Corinthians 4–2, East Reading 5–2 and Elgar Rovers. In the last game Simonds were trailing 1-0, but in the final 25 minutes scored 5 goals without reply. Old rivals Rabson Rovers held us to a 3-3 draw on their own ground.

In the Cups our successes have been even more noticeable. In the Berks and Bucks Intermediate Cup, Thames Vale were slammed 12and then Reading University 8-1, and in the second round of the Reading Senior Cup, Woodley were accounted for by 3 goals to nil. Kenny Shepherd leads the goal

coring with 18 followed by his brother-in-law Bobby Parkes 14.

The reserves' story is very similar, with five wins out of nine games in the first Division of the Reading Institute League. After their two initial victories reported in a previnitial victories reported in a prev-ious issue, they have beaten Wood-cote twice 7–2 and 3–2 and Cintra 4–1. Four close defeats were inflicted by Hurst 4–2, St. Nicholas 3–1, Nettlebed 4–2 and C.W.S. Printing 5–3. After accounting for Lower Tilehurst Reserves by 8 goals to 3 in the first Round of the Reading Junior Cup, an exciting match against a strong East Reading Reserve side was won 5-2 after extra time in the second round, which was followed by a resounding win by 7—1 against Southern Swifts Reserves in the third.

Chief goal scorers are Ernie Cartwright with 21 goals to his credit, with Terry Hawkins lying second with 15 goals scored.
