
Foremen's Dinner



GROUP BREWING ORGANISATION



GROUP BREWING ORGANISATION

EACH AREA IN the Group has a Brewing Committee of its own in the same way as the Areas have Sales Committees and Properties Committees.

The three Chairmen of the Arca Brewing Committees, together with the Technical Director in charge of brewing for the Group and a member of the Parent Board constitute the Group Brewing Committee. The member of the Parent Board is the Chairman of the Committee.

Put in a nutshell, the duties of the Committee are to produce what beers are wanted, when they are wanted, as economically as possible.

The functions of the Committee are set out clearly in the accompanying diagram and need no further explanation.

Although the duties of individual people shown in the diagram may appear to be divided into clear and separate compartments, they do in fact, and must at all times, work very closely together as a team.

The responsibility for the operation of the Breweries and for the quality of the beers produced in them, lies with the Areas in which the Breweries are situated and the mere existence of the Group Brewing Committee does not relieve them of this responsibility.

Although the Group Brewing Committee gives advice and lays down general policy for their side of the business, they do rely largely on ideas coming up to them from the Areas. Their job is to sort the ideas and make sure there is no overlapping.

READING FOOTBALL NOTES

AT THE TIME of writing these notes, the results of the matches played are as follows:—

1st team League: Played 9, won 3, drawn 4, lost 2.

Reserves League: Played 13, won 7, drawn 3, lost 3.

The 1st team opened the season against Rabson Rovers and suffered an 8—0 defeat, this was due mainly to injuries to two of our players, R. Roberts and P. Osborne, who will not be able to play again this season. Since then, however, the team has been playing steadily and the reserves brought in to the first team have given a good account of themselves. This season will be one of consolidation, and the selectors are looking to the future by playing some of the promising reserve team players in the 1st team for a few games so that they can gain experience of Premier League football.

It is good to see the reserves doing well this season, after struggling during the last few years. At present they are lying fourth in their league, and if they continue playing as they have been, they should obtain a high position at the end of the season. One or two experienced players now playing for the reserves have made all the difference this season and the good club spirit that now prevails should stand us in good stead for the future.


YOU PROBABLY KNOW the Angler's prayer:

We are quite certain that Mr. P. C. Longbon, that keen supporter of the Angling Section, has never had occasion to be anything but perfectly truthful in his fishing stories. If, however, in the past he has not wanted to spoil a good story by strict adherence to the facts, he has clearly been forgiven and the 23¼ lb. pike, measuring 42in. in length, with which he may be seen in our photograph, has given him a story which ought to last him for some time.

The epic encounter between Mr. Longbon and the pike took place at Wraysbury, on a cold, wet, windy Sunday in November. Here is his own story of the struggle, in which he was assisted by Mr. W. E. Naylor, Jnr.:—

"The first few hours produced no fish not even a run nor bite. We therefore decided to brave the weather and fish from a small punt. We made our way to a spot that we know had on previous occasions produced some large fish. We fished for a while, Naylor spinning with a spat, and myself using a sliding bung in twenty feet of water. Soon Naylor landed a good perch, of about 2 lb. and I using a small



gudgeon as livebait landed a nice pike of about 6 lb.

"We both rebaited, I using a ten foot carp rod with a 7 pound breaking strain line, and a small livebait gudgeon. Suddenly my bung slowly sank and I struck hard. I knew straight away that I was into a good fish, and prepared myself for a long fight because we were almost surrounded by nasty snags which the fish made for immediately. Given a little slack line my opponent obliged by swimming clear but even so it took some twenty minutes and many hard struggles before I managed to get the pike alongside the punt where Bill Naylor swiftly and neatly gaffed him and hauled him aboard."



Mr. Gosney received presentations from his colleagues at both Reading and Staines on his retirement.


MR. W. N. ERRINGTON
