

To Business by Boat

MR. P. C. PEPPER is a rather frail old man of 92. His son Mr. A. Pepper, has worked for Courages for over 40 years and is now in the Accounts Department at Horselydown.

Mr. Pepper, senior, has had connections with the Company since the 1880's and some of his reminiscences from those days make interesting reading. A keen sportsman, he played for Tottenham Hotspur before they became a professional team.

He was with Tomkins, Courage & Co., Malt factors of Mark Lane for over 50 years. He used to bring samples of malt to the Brewery before Tower Bridge was built, and would arrive by rowing boat at Horselydown Stairs. If the water was too choppy to make such a trip desirable, it was then possible to walk through a kind of drain-pipe from Tower Hill to Potters Fields, Tooley Street—cost, ½d. The original entrance to this tunnel on the north bank of the river is still to be seen on Tower Hill, just opposite the entrance to the Tower. It is a circular building resembling a large pepper pot. The walk, one gathers, was not a very attractive one. The tunnel was lit by gas jets at long intervals, and it was always damp with the water that seeped through.

When Mr. Pepper senior had finished his work at the Brewery, the brewer would hand him a chit which he could exchange for beer, bread and cheese in the Anchor Tap.

The nickname for a Brewery Director in those days was "Mr. Bung".

Mr. Pepper senior is in receipt of a pension from Courage's by virtue of an arrangement entered into many years ago between Courages and Tomkins, Courage & Co., whereby certain employees of the latter Company received pensions from the Brewery. He is one of the two such employees still surviving.

We understand that today he is in hospital and in failing health. We hope that he may overcome his present illness and may yet have more years before him in which to enjoy his memories of a bygone age.




